Dear Mr. Gilfillan:

The paint samples that you are trying to truce were received and analysed by me. A report of the analyses of the first group of these samples was sent via two separate secret teletypes through Bednarsey, Oakland Army Air Base to Commander Harris, Bikini CTG 1.2, Badsafe, P.A.C. One teletype was sent on September 18th and the other on September 3rd, 1946.

It was not clear just where the second set of samples came from, but they were forwarded to me by Dr. Kenneth Scott at Berkeley. Five copies of the report of the analyses of the second group of samples were made on October 10th, 1946. One was retained for our files and the other four classified as SECRET were cent through the Area Engineer at Berkeley to Dr. Kenneth Scott. A letter accompanied the four copies instructing Dr. Scott to retain one for his files, transfer one through the Manhattan Area Engineer to Capt. Walch, send the third one to Commander Harris and give the fourth copy to the Area Engineer for his files.

On 16 Hevember 1946, I received a letter from Lt. George B. Baniels, Gerps of Engineers, Intelligence and Security Officer, Manhattan Engineer District, P. O. Box 569, Berkeley, California, stating that the four copies of the data had been turned over to him by Dr. Scott and per authorisation of Col. E. D. Hishols had been classified as 30P SECREY.

I assume from Id. Baniel's letter that the four copies of the report are still in the Area Engineer's office at Berkeley. In the meantime, I had received a request from Col. Marron that copies of the two secret teletypes and of the report sent to the Berkeley office be made up and one sopy sent to Col. Marron's office at Rochester and the other be sent to Dr. Merbert Secville, Building L. Room L-2030, Navy Building, Machington, D.C. Thuse copies were unde up and classified as SECRET. This was before I had received the letter requesting that the information be classified as TOP SECRET.

A receipt for the copy sent to Col. Warren was signed for on 12 Movember, 1946 by Stafford L. Warren. The receipt for the copy sent to Dr.

December 19th, 1948 Subject: Paint Samples.

Merbert Secville was signed by a Major W. W. Stone on 15 November, 1946.

This gives the complete record of all reports on the samples you are trying to truce. I assume, then, that there is one complete copy in Dr. Scoville's effice in Washington; one complete copy in Col. Warren's effice in Rochester; one complete copy in my files here; copies of the first two teletypes in Commander Harris' office and four copies of the second report in the district engineer's office at Berkeley.

Now that the material has been elassified as TOP SECRET, I will have to have authorisation through Manhattan District security channels to send you the results. I would suggest that you initiate the request through the Washington office of the Manhattan District. I will be very glad to send you a scaplete report upon receipt of proper authorisation.
