Dear Governor Anderson:

This is in reply to your letter of May 24, 1954, requesting information concerning radiological fallout in South Dakota from the nuclear tests conducted in the Pacific.

As you may know, the Atomic Energy Commission maintains a country-wide radiation monitoring network of stations for collecting fallout. The enclosed copy of the Thirteenth Semi-Annual Report of the Atomic Energy Commission to Congress describes this monitoring program. The data obtained from stations in and around South Dakota show that the amount of fallout has been small indeed. The radioactivity might possibly be detected by the use of sensitive radiological survey instruments but the amount is far below a level to be hazardous to humans, plants or animals.

If there is additional information that you desire in this matter, we will be very happy to provide it.
