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STAFF STUDY

SUBJECT: Coordinating Information and Timing of Statements  
in Nuclear Energy and Related Fields

THE PROBLEM

1. To formulate recommendations with regard to overall coordination of public statements, information and timing of projects relating to the question of nuclear energy, particularly as to the extent of responsibility in these fields and as to which if any additional responsibilities the Board or other agencies might be charged with by the President.

FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM

2. OGB Responsibilities under Executive Order 10483

Executive Order 10483 provides for two types of OGB actions:

- a. Subparagraph (1) which deals with actions requested by the NSC assigned to OGB by NSC, charges the Board with "advising, with full consultation concerned" respecting "the execution of such security surveillance functions that it will make its full contribution to the attainment of the national security objectives and of the particular climate of confidence the United States is seeking to achieve in the world." In recognition of this function, the NSC recently assigned two actions to the OGB in the international nuclear energy field:

RECOMMENDATION FOR THE BOARD  
TO APPROVE AND FORWARD TO THE PRESIDENT

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- (1) HSC Action 104 charged the OCB with assisting the Council with respect to the timing of the release of the Ivy Film.
- (2) NSC Action 106 charged OCB with coordinating the timing of the public announcement of the nation-wide Civil Defense Exercise, as well as the general line to be taken by publicity about it.

b. A second responsibility of OCB stems from subparagraph (c) of Section 2 of Executive Order 11493 which provides that "the Council shall initiate new proposals for action within the framework of national security policies in response to opportunities and changes in the situation." In fulfillment of this function, the OCB, by action of December 1, 1963, authorized a program for the domestic law enforcement information program in support of the President's Civil Rights Task Force, involving representatives of the ADL and FCBA.

c. Subparagraph (d) of Letter C, cited above, provides that "the OCB can make recommendations to the HSC with regard to other related projects, which have not been specifically assigned to the HSC or the Council, but which may affect the national security of the United States and have been assigned to OCB by the Chairman."

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d. OCB's interest regarding the joint report by the Chairman AEC and the Chairman of the Joint Commission on Nuclear Weapons, Dr. George K. Hall, dated March 28, 1953, "Official Statements on Nuclear Weapons," charges officials of the Executive Branch with clearing nuclear weapons statements with the Chairman AEC, and charges the latter with clearing intelligence aspects w/ the Director of CIA, and foreign relation aspects with State. In two recent instances, the Chairman AEC has sought the advice of the DIA with respect to the nature and content of official statements on nuclear weapons. In letter to the OCB Staff Representative of February 14, 1954, the At. Warcr., being member requested OCB approval of the terms of the announcement of the United States Force Seven, and by letter to Col. B. Johnson on March 1, 1954, concerning public reporting of the Joint Commission's recommendations, the Chairman AEC stated:

"The ultimate decisions on whether to use atomic materials, how to adopt them, and what timing to choose in issuance, if it should be found desirable, must of course be made in the light of the judgments that would be assembled by the Interim Coordinating Board."

3. Additional Major Actions i.e. Presently Assigned to Implementation.

- a. A number of major public statements will be prepared to use the application of atomic energy, international machinery, scientific and technological, and exchange of weapons with UNR allies will be made in connection with the forthcoming hearings or commentaries on the Non-Proliferation Act. These hearings are presently scheduled for May.

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b. The FCDA has developed a document entitled "Civil Defense Planning Assumptions for the Fiscal Year 1955" which will soon be released for use by state and local Civil Defense organizations. These assumptions include a considerable amount of significant data with respect to the effect of nuclear weapons, targets destruction, etc.

c. A number of additional actions and public statements will need to be developed with respect to (a) the annual report, (b) the exchange of Civil Defense information with friendly countries, and public information developed through the OIM with respect to non-military defense measures (industrial dispersion, dispersion of defense equipment, etc.). These actions may have important aspects affecting the United States position overseas, depending principally upon their content and timing, and in relation to other significant overseas developments.

4. Major Responsibilities for Actions Cited Above.

a. The FCDA under authority of its budget and policy, will promptly disseminate appropriate Civil Defense information to all appropriate agencies.

b. The ANC under the Administering Agent of Civil Defense, will make available to Congress and the public pertinent information with respect to atomic energy.

c. The OIM, under authority of the National Defense Commission Reorganization Plan No. 3, has responsibility for developing plans for the use of non-military defense measures. It will provide information and recommendations on such measures.

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d. The Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, or his designee, for coordinating programs for the disclosure of atomic energy information to friendly countries. In carrying out this responsibility he operates through various agency channels depending upon the purpose involved.

#### DISCUSSION

5. NSC Actions 1045 and 1061, and the ABC Letters of 15 February and 1 March 1954, cited above, delineate USA's interests in the nuclear energy field. As precedents they suggest that the NSC should instruct the CCB to advise with the Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission and the Director of the FCDI on the timing, and manner of presentation of publications as may significantly affect the course of opinion in other countries the United States is seeking to maintain abroad. It is recognized, however, that those previously cited, logically would indicate:

- a. the timing of delivery, either of information contained in ABC/1, disclosure of classified information, or allied countries;
- b. manner and timing of release of publications to the public officials, the intelligence community or to the public, on nuclear weapons;
- c. domestic nuclear press, ground publications;
- d. military application aspects of ABC in existing weapons, and non-military application aspects of long range and Defense unclassified reports.

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6. In addition, since the new National Security Council will be established in the United States, coordinated by the Office of National Security (ONS), it would be well if OCB's responsibilities in the area of foreign climate intelligence analysis should make explicit the primary coordinating role of ONS; and the supervisory role of OCB with respect to the timing of projects and the timely release of information of significance to foreign climate intelligence.


#### CONCLUSIONS

7. In the discharge of its functions of coordinating the timing and execution of the programs affecting the national security, the permanent Coordinating Board has the clear responsibility of:

- a. Formulating the general policy of long-range climate intelligence which should be taken into account by agencies of the government. The Branch in the execution of approved NCS proposals should be charged with this problem.
- b. Proposing particular operations designed to produce specific results of significance for foreign climate intelligence. An opinion which supports the proposed probability of success of the proposals should prevail. The Coordinating Board should do everything done to achieve a sound and feasible project or operation, and as definite proposals are adopted by the Coordinating Board, by its member agencies, and forwarded to the National Security Council for execution, a written application.

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8. Climate of opinion can also be formulated by the NSC to provide all government actions in the sphere of nuclear energy and related projects which are capable of significant overseas impact. However, since there are many other significant factors which might militate against a program which seems desirable from a climate of opinion standpoint, the NSC must exercise judgments in balancing our economic versus foreign policy political objectives.

9. Review of the NSC programs assigned to OPR, the programs assigned to the AEC, the Office of Defense Mobilization, and the various delegations imposed upon departments and agencies by the Atomic Energy Act, Law (AEA) and Public Law 920 (FCDA) indicates that significant gaps for coordinated operational control exist in the areas of information gathering and in timing of, nuclear energy projects and related matters. It is further evident that the CCB, as a principal operational control mechanism of the National Security Council, should, in the interests of national security, position world-wide, take action to eliminate these gaps and to prevent to the detriment of national policy.

RECOMMENDATION

10. It is recommended that the operational control of all

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a. Inform the NSC with respect to (Ch responsibility) for the timing of projects and coordination of information in the field of nuclear energy and related projects, that:

"The OCB interest and concern is primarily to assure maximum foreign support of the U.S. international position with respect to national policies, programs and objectives. The OCB should therefore be in a position to express its views with respect to important statements and the timing of actions in the field of nuclear energy which could possibly have significant bearing on overseas programs.

"Inasmuch as the OCB interest is primarily in the foreign field as indicated above, it should not be the final authority for balancing domestic considerations against overseas considerations with respect to actions and statements in the field of nuclear energy. It will notify the NSC whenever such conflict or imbalance appears to exist.

"The OCB will develop a statement of basic policy considerations covered in statements and actions with respect to nuclear energy and related problems. This statement would be designed to provide guidance with respect to sensitive policies for the variety of the opinion fields among which the nuclear energy program

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


b. Request the NSC to issue the following executive order:

"In order to coordinate the manner and timing of  
the release of public information on the nuclear testing program  
which may affect the international security interests of  
the United States, the Operations Coordinating Board shall  
advise with the several agencies concerned with respect to  
the advisability and timing of public releases of information,  
official statements and reports of departmental and other  
information plans in the following categories:

- "A. Nuclear energy development of every  
category including development of the first  
Nevada Proving Grounds tests and the bases of  
public information liability concerning the same.
- "B. Guided missile development, refueling tanks,  
air offensive or defense, submarine capabilities, hydro-  
nuclear warheads, etc.
- "C. Announcement of nuclear aircraft development  
defense or nuclear aircraft development and  
exercises.
- "D. Leadership, scientific and medical progress and products of  
interest to atomic energy and power development and use.

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"Release of political prisoners during war,

military defence related to the following principles will be coordinated by the Office of Strategic Mobilization:

- "A. Reduction of urban target vulnerability.
- "B. Civilian defence policy other than that cited above.
- "C. Continuity of leadership.
- "D. Continuity of government.
- "E. Physical survival of civilians.


"OCB guidance as to the timing of release information, the timing of release of information, the first information, will be furnished by the Operations Coordination Board, Office of Defense Mobilization.

"Memorandum for the National Security Council, dated 12 January 1953, Subject: Office of Strategic Mobilization, the following is hereby amended so as to provide:

"Following the course of the Central Committee, and add to the Chairman of the National Security Council, the request the guidance of the Operations Coordination Board on aspects affecting the diplomatic consequences of diplomatic relations of the United States, the conduct of the Atomic Energy Commission, and the like."

such other activities of the Board as may be connected  
with this program."

c. Contingent upon NSC approval of the above, circulate the following MS,  
attached as TAB "A" with enclosure, to members of DDCI, Chairman, Director  
PCIA, and the Director CIA.

d. Establish working group composed of such other agency personnel as may be  
appropriate (1) to assist the Board in evaluating the security of information  
other agencies concerned with respect to US nuclear weapons programs, (2) to  
propose actions or statements pertaining to nuclear energy, (3) to  
initiate suggestions to the NSC or other appropriate body with respect to  
more effective exploitation of actions of State units in the field of nuclear  
energy. This group should have appropriate security clearance, be limited  
to ABC restricted data and the Chairman <sup>should</sup> ~~be~~ <sup>not</sup> responsible for disclosure of  
the UCB at which nuclear energy matters are discussed.



The area of United States Government policy regarding nuclear energy development is one of the most important problems of coordination and liaison in the field of nuclear energy development, both for scientific and general benefit and uses. The urgency of bringing about such coordination has been heightened by the need to maintain and enhance the American leadership established by the President's message of December 8, 1953, to the UN General Assembly. Major actions taken by the Government in public statements on nuclear energy and findings since October 1953 will be examined with an eye to making them available to the public at the earliest opportunity in support of this Nation's objective throughout the world.

The Board stands ready to serve in the capacity of our liaison. It will give first priority of attention to maintaining liaison with the working groups to expediting its work and making written judgments where appropriate. Our purpose is to find a friendly time and place of timing and content of official news or oral statement of the wide range of judgments available in the field; to represent officially to the Board and the working groups to make sure that no pertinent consideration will be overlooked; and that the specific approach for each to maintain international position in nuclear energy matter may be determined. The timing of actions taken and by officials will be determined by the Board in this field.

To reduce the possibility of lapses in oversight, the Board will

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consultation on matters of nuclear energy action or the like. In fact, the Board's staff and working groups have compiled the attached check list of items which in the judgment of the various agency representatives hold potentialities for harm or help to the advancement of the United States' interests.

It is suggested that agency heads advise their principal assistants dealing with these matters to bring them to the attention of the CEP for advisory comment on content or timing or operational significance as concerns national policy. The longer in advance notice can be provided, the more adequate and useful will be our advisory action.

The check list, of course, does not include all parts that might merit attention. It will be revised periodically. We will welcome your comments on additions--or deletions--which occur to you and your staff.

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Check List of Actions of Interest to COM Research Division  
in the Nuclear Energy and Related Fields

1. Actions in support of the President's proposals in his UN speech of December 8, 1953.
2. Major policy statements expressing or furthering U.S. proposals on international control of armaments.
3. Executive Branch proposals with respect to amendments to the Atomic Energy Act.
4. General content of information plans for and timing of public announcements on weapons test series at Pacific or Nevada Testing Grounds.
5. General content of information plans for and timing of public announcements, and official reporting materials including schedules of nation-wide civil defense exercises.
6. General content of information plans for and timing of public announcements and official reporting materials on military exercises, such as the proposed Strategic Air Command and Defense Command (SAC-ADC) exercises plan for July 1954.
7. General content of information plans for and timing of public announcements and reporting materials on major non-military industrial defense activities in the United States identified by OBM.
8. Declassified information proposed for release to public information and law enforcement agencies to aid them in detection of sabotage.

9. Timing of public announcements of nuclear deployment by military combat elements capable of employing nuclear weapons.
10. Official comment on guided missile developments reflecting an air offensive or air defensive capability involving nuclear characteristics.
11. Timing and content of public reporting activities on guided missile warfare, either offensive or defensive.
